Just as important are the grants that fulfill a teenagers dream to participate in a sport where they can learn about victory, defeat and the benefits of teamwork.

Education Apps for iPad

In my classroom, I was blessed to have students from amazingly diverse backgrounds and with an array of skills and strengths. I worked relentlessly to build in supports and foster an inclusive community for all of my students. This meant cutting, laminating, velcro-ing, washing, re-making, and constructing what felt like a million supportive learning devices for my students with and without special needs. Now, having an iPad, I often play around with apps that I realize would have been incredibly beneficial for my students with special needs.

Continuing with our Education Apps for iPad series, here are some apps grouped by category that students, parents, and teachers can leverage to support all learners!

Communication

Proloquo2Go. If you're familiar with PECS (Picture Exchange Communication System), you know how effective implementation of a picture-based communication system can be for children with linguistic or cognitive delays. Proloquo2Go is steeply priced, but it is perhaps the most highly recommended app for children and adults with a wide variety of special needs. Check it out if you're serious about utilizing tech for special needs support. (\$189.99)

Grace. Grace is a picture-based communication app that is a bit more accommodating for people with a budget. It was developed specifically for children with Autism, but as any teacher with nonverbal students knows, PECS can be helpful for students across the developmental continuum. (\$37.99)

<u>iConverse</u>. iConverse is a simpler and cheaper AAC device that focuses on basic needs. By creating custom commands, children can express needs beyond the basics and get the support they need and want (\$9.99)

<u>TapToTalk</u>. Love this because it's free and flexible. With a comprehensive picture library, teachers and parents can work with children with special needs to create libraries to make communication fun and personalized. (Free)

<u>iCommunicate</u>. In addition to the picture-based expressive features that the other AACs offer, with iCommunicate, teachers can create routines, custom pictures, learning aides, schedules, and audio clips. (\$39.99)

Behavior

<u>First Then Visual Schedule</u>. Transitions can cause a lot of frustration and angst for students and teachers in inclusive classrooms. First Then Visual Schedule makes transitioning easier and more concrete for those who need a boost understanding sequencing. (\$9.99) <u>AutismXpress</u>. For students who have difficultly understanding and coping with different emotions, AutismXpress displays fun and instructional basic facial expressions. (free)

<u>CBTReferee</u>. CBT is a "cognitive behavioral therapy" app that serves as a referee to curtail negative thinking. For students in need of a more optimistic outlook and some encouragement, CBTReferee could be super helpful. (\$4.99)

Earn It Stars. Earn It Stars doesn't have the most elegant design, but with a high utility and low price point, it may eliminate the bulky sticker roll buried in your desk or behavior printouts that have you standing in line at the staff room copier. Set goals and benchmarks for receiving stars as positive reinforcement. (\$0.99)

Skills

Everyday Skills. From riding buses to measuring ingredients, Everyday Skills provides self-directed lessons for living independently. (\$39.99)

<u>iDress for Weather</u>. This one is helpful for morning morning routines in that it assists users in making sound clothing choices for local weather. (\$1.99)

<u>Dance Party Zoo</u>. Advancing basic motor skills can be difficult for students dealing special needs. Apps like Dance Party Zoo are fun and funny, supporting children in controlling and exploring physical movement. (\$2.99)

<u>iWriteWords</u>. Fine motor skills are important not only to writing but in completing day-to-day tasks (tying shoes, snapping buttons, drinking out of a glass). iWriteWords is a fun and engaging way to support fine motor and literacy development. (\$2.99)
